BANK OFFICIALS INDICTED

Four officials of the wrecked Title Guarantee & Trust Company of Portland have been indicted and now face felony charges arising out of the crooked transactions of that institution. The officers arrested are: J. Thorburn Ross, T. T. Burkhardt, John E. Aitchison and George H. Hill, and four informations were filed against each of them by District Attorney Manning. Ross and Burkhardt are held under bonds of \$20,000 each, while the other two are held under bonds of \$8000 each.

The failure of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company of Portland, which occurred several months ago, brought to light a system of financial operations by the officials of that institution, through subsidiary companies, which made Thomas W. Lawson's story of "Frenzied Finance" read like the tale of a Sunday School collection. Arrest and conviction on felony charges is the surest way of discountenancing that method of high finance, and will safeguard for the future the savings of depositors.

PETTIBONE ACQUITTED

The trial of George A. Pettibone, charged with complicity in the murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg of Idaho, along with Haywood, Moyer, Simpkins and Orchard, was ended last Saturday forenoon, when the Idaho jury returned a verdict of not guilty, after deliberating fourteen hours. It is understood that at the first ballot the jury stood four for conviction and eight for acquittal, and only after a number of ballots an agreement was reached on acquittal.

Hampered by the rules of evidence regarding corroboration of testimony of the character given by Orchard, the jury evidently found the evidence adduced by the state insufficient to base a conviction upon, but in the great tribunal of public opinion the Orchard confession still stands unimpeached, a record of murder and crime unequalled in the history of this country.

Abe Ruef, the deposed San Francisco "Boss", who since his arrest as a result of the graft investigation in that city has been occupying a suite of rooms in a private residence, under special guard, has been moved from his luxurious quarters and given a cell in the county jail. That is where criminals of the Ruef stripe belong. At the county jail he will have as neighbors ex Mayor Schmitz of San Francisco, several of the officers of the rotten California Safe Deposit Bank, whose arrest followed the exposure of the bank's crooked methods, and other prominent "crooks" of the city by the Golden Gate.
