The new wheat is bearded, and the heads are many times as large as a club wheat Head, the berry also being larger than that of ordinary wheat. No mill test of the grain has ever been made, although the chemist at the Idaho experiment station has made a very flattering chemical analysis.

Madras Pioneer single stalk of the "Alaska" wheat, as it is called, was found in 1904. The seed was planted and the next year it yielded seven pounds.
