

**Openings at Madras.**

Harvey brothers started for the railroad yesterday morning with two loads of wheat.

Miss Jessie Isham came down Monday from Culver, where she has been visiting at the home of her sister, Mrs. George Cyrus.

Wilhelm Gomer has sold his quarter section of land near Methodist Hill to Frank H. May of Bend, the deal having been closed Tuesday. This place is one of the best improved and most nicely located quarters in that locality, and Mr. May is fortunate in having secured it. Mr. Gomer has invested in fruit land near Jacksonville and desired to concentrate his holdings nearer his new home, and for this purpose decided to sell his land in this vicinity. He is winding up a few business matters here, and expects to return to Jacksonville in a few days.

**Bethel Looking Over Line**

N. W. Bethel, locating engineer on the North Bank road, and who has recently been identified with the revived Oregon Trunk Line project up the Deschutes canyon, was in Madras Tuesday. He spent the day here and in this vicinity, going down the Willow Creek canyon about in the forenoon. Mr. Bethel's present connection with the Oregon Trunk Line has been urged as proof positive that Hill is behind that project, but on the other hand a Portland paper is authority for the statement that Mr. Bethel has not been in the Hill employ for three years and that his connection with the Oregon Trunk has no significance so far as Hill is concerned. At any rate, the presence of an engineer of Mr. Bethel's prominence inspecting the survey of the Oregon Trunk Line into Madras, indicates that this project is a very live one. It is known that two surveying parties in the employ of this company are now checking up the surveys in the Deschutes canyon made two years ago.

Mr. Bethel was accompanied by a Mr. Crane, who remained here, and who yesterday drove down to the mouth of Trout Creek. From remarks let drop it is believed that a party of surveyors will be put to work here at once, running a line down Willow Creek.

An attempt was made to interview Mr. Bethel during his visit here, but he had nothing to say for publication.
