Professor Riley Cook and family moved down from Haystack last Saturday, into their comfortable new cottage in Madras.

U. A. Wynn, right of way agent for the Central Oregon railroad, who has been working in this section for a month or more, left the first of the week for Culver, where he will continue his work of securing right of way along the C. O. line.
