GENERAL APATHY TO THE REAR IN CAMPAIGN

Old General Apathy has been relieved of the command of the Republican national campaign, and from this time on until election day in November, there promises to be no lack of interest. The past week has been enlivened by a tilt between President Roosevelt and Candidate Bryan, as an outcome of the exposure of the record of Governor C. N. Haskell of Oklahoma, treasurer of the Na tional Democratic Committee, whose close connection with the Standard Oil interests was shown, and who has since resigned the treasurership of the national committee.

The spectacle of a President of the United States engaging in a wordy combat with a presidential candidate over the issues of the campaign is without precedent. But, to those who have properly gauged the devotion of President Roosevelt to the cause for which the Republican party and his administra tion stand, there is no occasion for surprise. Time and time again has the President taken up the cudgel in defense of his administration, and the exigen cies of the present have been sufficient justification for ignoring the precedent or lack of precedent in the past. In the present instance no one could construe the President's partic ipation in the campaign as partisan politics. It is broader than that. It is the continuation of his fight for the moral uplift, for the integrity of our H. W. Campbell, the originator of what financial system, for the welfare is known as the "Campbell system" of dry of our wage earners, and for the square deal to all our business interests.
