TWO RAILROADS TO MADRAS

Developments each week in the railroad situation with reference to Central Oregon, all tend to confirm the belief that two roads will be built into this section by the Deschutes route—the Oregon Trunk Line and the long-promised Harriman road. Both lines have practically completed their surveys from the mouth of the Deschutes river to Madras, and both are securing right-of-way along their surveys as rapidly as the same can be negotiated, and in cases where the right-of-way cannot be bought condemnation suits have been instituted.

The Harriman interests have definitely announced their determination to build into Central Oregon at once, and have practically signified their adoption of the Deschutes route for the promised line. The suspension of all engineering work on the Corvallis & Eastern extension, and the concentration of all the engineering forces of the O. R. & N. company on the North and South line is also significant of a decision in favor of the Deschutes route.

The Oregon Trunk Line, generally supposed to have the backing of the Hill interests, has made no announcement of its purpose, but that fact is in no wise discouraging. Mr. Hill has declared that a premature announcement of the plans of the North Bank road cost him a mint of money and that he would not make this mistake again. But the Oregon Trunk Line has secured the choice of routes into Central Oregon, with low grades and light curves, and the character of the engineering work is a strong indication that this line is no cheap promotion, done with a view of making money by selling out its rights. The careful survey of this line and the purchase of practically all of its right-of-way, is no absolute guarantee that it will be built, but it is a mighty good sign upon which to build hopes of that outcome.

Altogether, the outlook is very encouraging, not only for rail transportation for Central Oregon, but for the construction of two roads into this section by way of the Deschutes canyon in the immediate future.

The settlement of the litigation which has tied up the Oregon King mine for a number of years, will be very welcome news to a number of people residing in the Ashwood country, for there is reason to hope, now, that the Oregon King will be re-opened and active operations resumed. Ashwood was a lively little camp when the Oregon King was at work, and a stimulus was given to other prospect work in the camp, but with the closing down of the mine on account of the litigation, the camp became a dead one, practically all other prospect work being abandoned. The decision in the Oregon King case will bring new life to the camp.

The commencement of construction on one or both of the Deschutes roads into Central Oregon on January 1 would be a little late for a Christmas present. But it would be a mighty good way to start in the New Year.
