THE RIGHT SPIRIT

The Madras school district acted wisely in voting the bond issue for needed improvements, and the overwhelming majority in favor of the measure displays a community spirit which augurs well for the school. The tax necessary in keeping up the interest on the bonds will be light, and the sentiment towards maintaining a good school and providing for improvements when needed is the proper attitude for a community towards its school. In addition to the county tax for school purposes the Madras district this year levied a tax amounting to 15 mills, and this disposition to maintain a good school at some personal sacrifice if necessary, reflects credit upon the taxpayers of the district. It is this spirit which will before many years build up in Madras as good a public school as there is in the state.

The community could have no better advertisement than a good school, and a fact which reflects credit upon the businessmen of the town, is that with out exception they have supported every movement to improve the school. It takes time to build up a good public school, but with the hearty support of the business men of the community the work is greatly lessened, and the Madras school will continue to advance in efficiency until every resident of the district will have occasion to feel proud of it.

The amount raised by the recent bond issue will provide for only a modest new building, but it will be large enough to provide for the present needs of the school, and no larger amount of bonds could be issued under the law. Strict economy in the expenditure of the money, however, will provide a schoolhouse of which the district need not be ashamed.

MADRAS WHEAT

A prominent Washington flouring mill man is authority for the statement that the Madras wheat is the best produced on the Pacific coast for milling purposes, owing to its richness in gluten. Several weeks ago a number of samples of the different varieties of wheat produced in this section were sent to this miller at his request, and his report contains the above very flattering statement. One sample of grain, to which especial reference was made, was of the little club variety and was grown by A. D. Anderson at his ranch on Agency Plains. A test of this sample showed 70 per cent gluten. The quality of the wheat is due to certain properties of the soil in this section which are more abundant than in older farming districts. It was this peculiar quality which ten years ago made Sherman county wheat famous as the best milling wheat produced on the coast.

The prospects for the erection of a 200-barrel flouring mill at this point in the near future are very encouraging to all who are interested in the development of the wheat district surrounding Madras. A mill of that capacity would consume 1000

bushels of wheat daily in the manufacture of flour, and would make a strong local market which would insure to the producers of this section the very best prices for their grain. In addition to this, under the plan proposed by the promoter of the flouring mill project, the farmers of this section will have an opportunity to profit in the manufacture of the flour as well as in the production of the wheat. The proposition offered presents an opportunity to the farmers of this district which may not come again, and they should promptly give the enterprise such substantial encouragement as to insure the location of the mill at this place. The Madras country is destined to become one of the great wheat-producing districts of the state. The wheat grown in the district will produce the highest grade of flour manufactured on the Pacific coast, and Madras, the center of this district, should with the coming of the railroad become one of the banner milling points of the state.
