AN EFFORT IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

An effort is being made by the Farmers' Union in this locality, to get the government Reclamation Service to extend the scope of the work to be undertaken by it immediately, so as to include a large area in this immediate section, and a petition will be forwarded to Washington in a short time, containing the signatures of a majority of the settlers in this end of the county.

The purpose of this effort is along the right lines, for preliminary investigations conducted both by the government and private enterprises have demonstrated the feasibility and practicability of such an undertaking. The chief of the Reclamation Service has announced that no work can be undertaken in the interior until there are better transportation facilities, for the reason that it costs too much to transport heavy materials to interior points at the present time.

However, there is every indication that Central Oregon is going to get a railroad within a short time, and in the meantime, no effort to get the government to take up irrigation work in this section is misdirected. If no other purpose is served it will show the friendly attitude of the settlers of this section toward the government reclamation service, which at other points in this state has met with much annoying opposition from settlers over frivolous objections. This opposition has had a tendency to discourage the rapid extension of the reclamation work in this state, and a petition from this section, showing a disposition on the part of the settlers to meet any fair terms and conditions imposed by the government, would have weight in attracting favorable attention to this district.

This district lies within the semi-arid region of the state, and no other section of the Northwest would respond to irrigation work with proportionately greater benefits. The main purpose of the government reclamation work is to provide more homes in a given area by increasing the productivity, and in regions like this that purpose is best served. Under present methods of dry land farming large farms will be the rule, because of the necessity of summer-fallowing half of the land farmed each year, whereas under irrigation 40 acres in this locality, with its advantages of soil, climate and altitude, would provide a profitable farm for any settler.

REJOICING AT KLAMATH FALLS

Klamath Falls has learned the lesson that "all good things come to those who watch and wait." It has been many years since the people of Klamath began their watching and waiting for the railroad, and yesterday regular train service was established on the line just completed to that place.

Crook county and the rest of Central Oregon will rejoice with Klamath Falls in its good fortune, wondering at the same time how long it will be before

reward comes to the rest of us who are watching and waiting. It is reported that the Klamath road is building on North, and that construction work is actually under way several miles North of that place, which strengthens our belief in the good faith of the Deschutes railroad, with which it will ultimately connect.

There promises to be a building boom in Madras this Summer, in which event the sound of the saw and the hammer will drown the voice of the knocker, a few of whom we still have with us. So hope on, for the knocker likes the sound of his own voice, and when the music of industry drowns that out he will move on to some more quiet spot to ply his trade.

In the name of the State of Oregon you and each of you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause on or before the 18th day of October, 1909, and if you fail to so appear and answer or otherwise plead to said complaint on or before said date, the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in said complaint, to-wit: For judgment against you and each of you for the sum of \$1800, together with interest thereon from December 23, 1902, at the rate of 8 per cent per annum, in U. S. Gold Coin of the present standard value; for the further sum of \$200 attorney fees and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements made and expended in this suit.
