MYSTERIOUS DOUBLE TRAGEDY AT REDMOND

News has been received here of a double tragedy at Redmond last Sunday, Louis H. Worley and his wife having been found dead by a neighbor at their ranch near that place. Worley and his wife were a bride and groom of only four days, Mrs. Worley having arrived from Chicago on Wednesday of last week for the purpose of marrying Worley. They went to the ranch immediately after the wedding, and Sunday a neighbor who went to call on them found the body of the husband in the barn, and the body of the wife in the charred ruins of their home, which was burned to the ground. Complete mystery surrounds the tragedy. Worley was a prosperous settler on one of the best irrigated farms near Redmond. A .32 calibre revolver was found near the body of Worley, which gave rise to the theory that he had killed his wife, burned the house and then killed himself. An investigation by the coronor's jury, however, failed to disclose any signs of violence on the woman's body.
