The assembling of construction forces along the Harriman line between the mouth of Trou-Creek and Madras, has an ap pearance of good faith on the part of that road that no amount of work along the river at conflicting points could give. The Harriman road leaves the Deschutes canyon at Trout Creek while the Oregon Trunk Line continues on up the canyon to Willow Creek, and between Trout Creek and Madras there is no conflict between the rival lines.
