Max Lueddemann and a Mr Taylor of Spokane arrived in town last Thursday. Mr. Taylor is very much interested in the Madras country and is investigating the wheat lands with a view to investing quite extensively in the near future.

County Commissioner Bayley of Laidlaw arrived in town Monday and has joined Road viewer Elliott and County Surveyor Rice, who have been viewing out the several roads ordered viewed at the last term of the county court.

Superintendent of Construction Burdick, for Porter Brothers, went through Madras Tuesday morning on his way to the railroad camp on Crooked River. He passed back through town in the evening going to camps on the Deschutes.

The work of getting the plant in operation is being pushed as rapidly as possible, as it is desired to get the first contract of 500,000 brick burned before the cold weather sets in. With this end in view, Mr. McNealey is working crews both night and day at the brick yard.

J. C. Waymire, who has owned and operated the large pumping plant and feed mill on his ranch adjoining the town site, has disposed of his interests here, including his ranch and residence. Fred Green of Culver has taken over the residence and pumping plant and expects to take possession as soon as other business matters will permit. It is understood the price paid is \$2000. The land, with the exception of a small tract, was sold to Duncan McLeod of Prineville, and it is reported the tract will be platted, as soon as practicable, placed on the market and sold principally for residence purposes. The purchase price was \$3500. This is a nicely located and desirable property and it is fortunate for the town of Madras that such a desirable residence district will soon be upon the market.
