CONSTRUCTION WORK SHOWS MUCH ACTIVITY

Harriman And Hill's Aggressive Warfare Confined Principally To

Field Operations

The active warfare of the Harriman and Hill interests in the courts and the Deschutes canyon seems to have reached a more tranquil stage, even if not entirely abated, and each of the titans is now exerting all the energy possible toward getting its respective lines completed. The sit- empiled, it is noted with much interest uation at present is that the two great the material increase in the amount of precipitation, both of rain and snow, the former showing a total of 10.38 inches and the latter 58.61, making a total of approximately 15 inches of moisture for the year ending December 31, The year 1908 was also somewhat

above the average in the amount of moisture which is supposed to fall in this section. Although there was no weather observer at this place during that year, a conservative estimate made in comparason with the precipitation of a few years previous, would tend to show that probably from 10 to 12 inches of moisture fell in this section during 1908. In view of the reports which have been current heretofore that six or eight inches per year was the maximum for the fall of moisture in this section, the considerable increase of the last two years would indicate that a wetter climate is to be the rule for the Central Oregon country.

The change is an especially pleasing one to residents of the interior, who, with the increased precipitation, are assured of sufficient moisture for the maturing of crops. And, if other climatic conditions are not altogether favorable, even a partial failure of crops in the country East of the Cascades will be a great rarity.

Brilliant Comet Visible To This Vicinity

LOCATED NEAR HORIZON IN SOUTHWESTERN SKY

Not Halley's Comet, But A Newcomer, -- Made First Appearance Last Monday

The residents of Madras obtained their first view of a comet Monday evening about5:45 p. m., although it appears that this is not the much talked of Halley's comet which it is reported will be visible next May, but one recently discovered by a South African astronomer. 1910 that has been asked for in any The comet Monday evening (from an amateur's point of view) appeared in the Western sky, slightly to the South, not far above the borizon, and a short distance North of the evening star, Ver nus. The first glimpse of the comet is seen between 5:30 and 6:00 p. m. Mon; tem. At the same time he hopes that day evening the comet was very bright and its tail showed a considerable distance into the sky, extending perpendicularly from the star or comet proper. Some idea of the equipment budget Tuesday evening the comet was again cloudy and the view was not so distinct. On this evening the tail appeared as if it curved slightly toward the South.

The subjoined dispatch explains the appearance of the comet in this vicinity.

San Jose, Cal., Jan. 18 .- Astronomer. R. G. Aitken, of the Lick Observatory, oday gave the following statement for the Associated Press:

"The comet discovered in South Africa a day or two ago is brighter than the planet Venus. It was easily seen at the Lick Observatory at noon today with the naked eye. It was four degrees east of the sun and one-half of a degree north of it, and was moving toward the northeast,

"In a clear sky it should be a brilliant object for the next few evenings, and should be looked for in the southwestern

sky immediately after sunset. "Daylight observations today by Asa tronomer Wright showed that the spece trum of the comet's nucleus is continua ous, crossed by bright radium lines exa tending into the coma."

CITY ELECTION -- LAW **COVERNING--THE TICKETS**

The first city election of Madras will be held in Sanford'shall Monday, January 31, 1010, for the purpose of voting for or against incorporation, and if it carries, to elect city officials.
