The one great question of interest to this particular locality at the present time, is the irri gation of extensive plains North of Crooked River, which can only be accomplished by private company, owing to the fact that the government is not going to spend any money on new projects until some of the present ones are completed.

Many objections are presented against the idea of allowing such an enterprise to get into the hands of private individuals. but there is a state law which regulates the time that work miles south of Madras on the has to commence, and also requires the payment of taxes on private owned water and power sites. This will have a tendency to assist those interested in this section, in that the project will have to be completed within a stated time.
