

# CITY COUNCIL HAS MEETING

## No Action Taken on Franchises

**\$765.96 COLLECTED**

Special Meeting Tonight To Take Up Telephone Franchise Ordinance—Ordinances Remedied

The regular monthly meeting of the city council was held Tuesday evening. Present were Mayor H. W. Turner, Councilmen S. E. Gray, T. B. Tucker, W. H. Cook and W. R. Cook. Councilman W. S. Smith came in late. Councilman T. A. Long was absent.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A communication from Amme & Garrow, electric engineers of Portland, was read. This company wanted information about securing a franchise for an electric light and power system. The matter was informally discussed though no conclusion was reached. The mayor was instructed to write the Portland firm and get them to submit a definite proposal.

The report of Treasurer D. W. Barnett was read. It showed the total amount collected to date for fines, licenses and taxes to be \$765.96.

Marshal A. W. Culp reported that the city jail had been repaired and fenced according to instructions from the council. The marshal was directed to equip the jail with suitable beds and other necessities.

The matter of granting a franchise to I. F. Shutt and Ed Mason for a local telephone system was brought up. These gentlemen propose to wire the town and to also extend lines for a connection with the Lamonta farmer line, and also with the lines at Warm Springs. This question will be considered fully at a special meeting of the council which will be held Thursday evening.

No new ordinances were passed, although a few discrepancies in ordinances already in effect were remedied by change in certain sections.

Crazy Youth Taken To Prineville By Sheriff Elkins

Christopher Smith, a young man about 20 or 25 years old, last Saturday morning exhibited insane tendencies and was taken in charge by the city authorities and held until Sunday, when Sheriff Elkins arrived from Prineville and took the young man there to be judged as to his sanity.

For a day or two Smith had been noticed to be acting and talking queer, but on Saturday morning he took a spite at Dr. Long's signs and proceeded to tear them from the building. He said he read in the Madras paper that Dr. Long was a fake and that he thought the signs ought to come down. But little could be learned from Smith about his antecedents. He drifted in here the first of last week and was employed about the Madras Hotel for a day or two. He said he came from Pennsylvania, and that his home was wherever he took his hat off. This poor boy is more of an imbecile than an insane subject. His talk and actions were very childish.

"What are they keeping me here for," he asked. "I'm to eat and not work. What do you know about that?"

### AFTER THE PRIZE AGAIN

Farmer That Beats Madras Man's Exhibit Will Have To Hurry

Tillman Reuter was in town from his ranch Saturday. He says the season so far has been very propitious for all kinds of crops, and that he intends to have a fine exhibit of both farm and garden specimens for the fairs this fall. Mr. Reuter has been awarded first prize for the best dry farming exhibit at the last two county fairs and intends to try to win it again this year, then he says he will be contented. Many of the specimens which helped win at the Billings dry farming congress last fall were grown by him. This year he has a couple of dozen or more different varieties of potatoes planted and about half that number of varieties of barley. He tries all kinds, then eliminates the ones which do not come up to standard. The dry farmer who wins this year over Mr. Reuter will have to go some.
