Judge Grants No Injunction

United States Judge Bean has refused to issue a restraining order that will stop construction on either of the railroads up Deschutes canyon at the behest of the Eastern Oregon Land Co. which has made an attempt to collect damages from the railroads for crossing its lands at Sherar's Bridge, where the land company proposes to build a dam 60 feet high and the railroads made their surveys and built their grades to conform to this requirement. After the work was all done the land company concluded to build a dam 100 feet high and wanted to collect damages from the roads on account of their interference. To change their surveys and rebuild their grade of the railroads would cost them \$2,500,000.

The claim made by the land company has all the appearance of being a plain case of holdup, and the application for an injunction does not seem to have had a very strong standing with the court. Judge Bean suggests that the proper procedure would be an action for the recovery of such damages as the land concern may have suffered, and refused to issue any preliminary injunction that would stop construction of the railroads.

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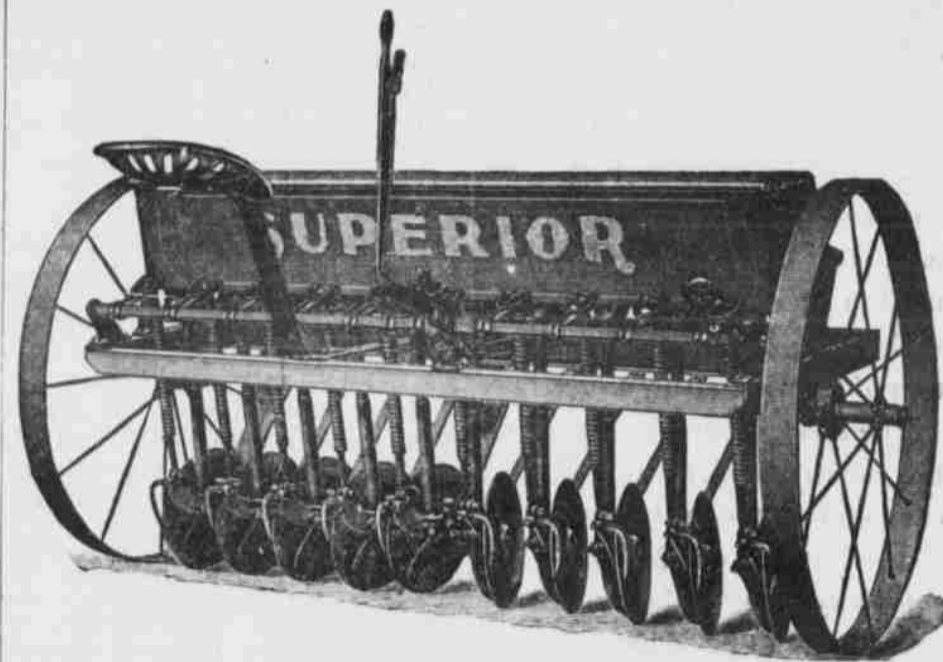
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
