CETTING IN READINESS TO COMMENCE CRADING

Kennedy & Fraser, the subcontractors for the first 10 miles of Oregon Trunk grade south of town have been busy this week establishing their first camp and getting ready for the commencement of their work. Their main camp has been located about three miles south of town in the draw just this side of the cross roads at the Hahn homestead. They will probably employ about 400 men on their contract. 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
