**\$350 Purses for
Baseball**

BOARD MAKE EARLY START

Plan to Make County Show the
Best Ever Attempted—After
Band Already

The board of directors of the Crook County Fair Association met Saturday to discuss ways and means for the fair this fall.

Larger purses will be hung up for baseball. It was decided to give \$350 toward a baseball tournament; \$200 for first money, \$100 for second and \$50 for third. Besides the cash prizes the association will offer a championship silver cup to be the property of the club that can win it three times in succession. The ball tournament will commence on Thursday, October 20, and continue Friday and Saturday. The games will be played in the forenoon so as to not interfere with the racing.

The association has granted the free use of the fair grounds to the baseball boys for practice or for match games.

The board took up the matter of securing a band for the fair this fall. A committee was appointed to see what could be done in this respect and will report at a later meeting.

The members of the directorate are getting down to business early this season and seem to be imbued with a determination to make the fall fair surpass anything before attempted.—Prineville Journal.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS FOR REDMOND

An electric lighting plant has been ordered for Redmond. Sixth street and the different business houses will be a blaze of light just as soon as the Crook County Light & Power Company can get a dynamo and other necessities in from Portland and the system installed. That may not require more than 60 days.

The plant to be installed at this time will be temporary but large enough to care for the present needs of the town. While the community has been developing in every detail, the affairs of the Crook County Water, Light & Power Company have been going ahead apace. They have been steadily at work on their power proposition at Cline Falls, but it developed that it would be the end of the year at the earliest before the water power plant can be put into operation. The company thought that would be too long to wait and ordered the temporary plant.

The order was placed Monday with J. B. Frem, traveling agent of Fairbanks, Morse & Co., and was the culmination of considerable correspondence between the power company and the manufacturers on the subject of machinery. The order is for dynamo, lamps with all the necessary fixtures, New Special Electric engine and the necessary wire. Poles will be procured in this locality. It is the intention of the company to distribute 400 candle power of light for illuminating Sixth street. The lights will be sold to individuals at the rate of \$1

for 16 candle power per month. It is understood that the company will ask for a city franchise as soon as the town is incorporated.

This power company is a corporation composed of 16 local men. They own all the power at Cline Falls in the Deschutes River four and one-half miles west of here. At this time they are at work on the main power plant. This plant will develop two units of 750 horse power each.

Besides lighting the streets and buildings of Redmond the power company will make arrangements with the townsite company for supplying the town with water.—Redmond Hub.

RESTORING SOME FOREST LANDS TO ENTRY

An aggregate of nearly 100,000 acres have been thrown out of National forests in Oregon and added to the unreserved public domain by the latest proclamations issued by the President in carrying out the plan recently adopted for rearranging the forest boundary lines.

The following shows the total eliminations from each of four National forests in the state: Malheur, 4485 acres; Whitman, 61,756; Deschutes, 16,152, and Umatilla, 69,518.

The total eliminations in the entire country amount to 721,714 acres, and the total additions to National forests aggregate 199,003 acres.

Merchants and others should remember that there is an ordinance in effect in Madras, prohibiting the explosion of fireworks of any form within the corporate limits. The celebration here will be "safe and sane in that respect at least."
