Gentlemen:—In reply to your favor of recent date, I can only give you my experience and opinion.
I have grown alfalfa on my farm near Culver 16 years without irrigation or reseeded. The yield per acre
has been from 3 to 3½ tons. For the past five years I have cultivated heavily in the spring with a disc har-
row, under which treatment the stand is improving. I have no doubt but that the same may be profitably
grown as a seed crop if planted in drill rows and cultivated. Yours very truly, G. SPRINGER.

On my dryer ground where I cut only once I frequently have a fine quality and good yield of seed, but I
have never grown seed for the market.—G. S.
