

**CITY COUNCIL MEETING.**

The regular monthly business meeting of the City Council for July was held on the evening of the 5th.

Present were Mayor H. W. Turner, Councilmen T. B. Tucker, S. E. Gray, W. R. Cook, Dr. T. A. Long, W. H. Cook, and Recorder Jackson. Councilman W. S. Smith was absent.

The report of Recorder J. H. Jackson was read and accepted. This report shows that during the month of June 61 persons were haled into the Recorder's Court for offenses against the city. Fines were collected in the sum of \$352 in cash, while orders for \$18 more are in hand, which if cashed will make a total of \$370 in fines for the month.

Eleven "undesirables" were ordered to leave the city during June.

Treasurer's receipts for license fees to the amount of \$206.79 and dog tax receipts for \$31 were turned in during the month.

The recorder states that he has used his best efforts to have all offenders against the city brought to justice.

The report of Treasurer D. W. Barnett shows funds on hand June 30, in the sum of \$1760.56.

The big water tank for sprinkling the street has raised quite a "dust" in the council. Some think it cost too much; others think it a bum job, while yet another faction hold that the City of Madras did not officially order the tank built, that is was to be provided for by private subscription. All claims for building and fitting up this tank were referred to the committee on finance for investigation.

The matter of providing a suitable house for storing the chemical fire extinguisher was placed in the hands of the committee on streets and public property. The committee is having a small shed built just south of the McTaggart building on Main street.

The lunch booth in the street in front of the moving picture show received passing notice. The marshal was instructed to order the booth removed. The marshal ordered as directed but the owner "spared for wind" and blew back to the council on last Monday evening. Then that body issued another order to the marshal to move the booth sure on Tuesday morning.

The council voted at this meeting to submit the question of bonding the city for a sum not to exceed \$8000 to meet the expense of installing a city-owned public water system to a special election. This question was taken up in the meeting held Monday evening of this week, a report of which appears in another column.

It appearing to the council that rumors attacking the integrity of the police force have been circulated a committee composed of Councilmen T. B. Tucker, W. R. Cook and S. E. Gray were appointed to make an investigation and report their findings.

Treasurer D. W. Barnett asked for a raise in salary and his request was granted. His compensation has been \$50 per year, and he asked for \$25 per month. The council finally agreed to him \$20 per month.

**EMANUEL REICHEN DROWNS IN SANTIAM**

Wednesday afternoon July 6 at a point near the mouth of the Santiam River, occurred the death of Emanuel Reichen, aged 25 years and three months, by drowning.

Mr. Reichen, with a party of friends, was in bathing and the water was not very deep but swift. It is supposed that he was caught by an undercurrent and kept from coming to the surface, after the first time sinking. The body was recovered from the river about one hour after the accident, and the remains were immediately prepared for shipment to his parent's home near Madras.

His sister and brother, Maggie and John Reichen of Portland, and Elder G. L. Neil of Wood-

burn accompanied the body here.

Interment was held Sunday at the Methodist Hill Cemetery, and the services were conducted by Rev. G. L. Neil, of the Church of God.

The deceased had a home-stand four miles south of town near Willow Creek. He had been attending the Camp meeting of the Church of God about two weeks and was at the time of his death on his way home.
