Crook County, Wet, Or Dry
No honest person will argue that Local Option has had a square deal in Crook County. Even the liquor dealers would blush to say that Local Option has been tried and failed. Whatever the failure may be, it is not the fault of the law. Mark that down. Whether Crook County goes dry in November will depend on whether men will do their duty. Women cannot vote, they can only petition, and furnish the saloon its victims; then wring their hands and cry: "Men! what, what will you do about it?"
Three Governors Against The Saloon
Governor Hay of Washington believes the saloon should be annihilated, and publicly declares his sentiments. Governor Brady of Idaho declares he would not be a candidate for reelection on a ticket endorsed by the saloon, but will run on a prohibition or Local Option plank in the platform. Just last week Governor Campbell of Texas sent a special message to the legislature urging the passage of a law prohibiting saloons within 10 miles of any public school in the state. (Saloons in Oregon are the same as saloons in Texas.)
If we ignore moral issues, permitting those who live by the sins of others to enjoy and enrich themselves at the expense of decency, order, truth and purity; if our political parties make their contests simply a struggle for the "loaves and fishes," not even hinting at the evil in our midst, except to wink at its mischief, we greatly fear that in a few years our own little city will be sitting in the dust and ashes of desolation and ruin.
