More Combines.

A. C. Sanford, local agent and W. A. Hunt salesman for the Holt Harvester Company this week took orders for three more combined harvesters to be shipped in time to harvest next year's crop. Frank King of Methodist Hill will have a 12-foot Baby, T. J. Leach and Bob Armstrong of Culver will together purchase a similar machine, and W. S. Williams of Agency Plain has ordered a 14-foot Baby. Other orders are in prospect, but the deals have not yet been closed. The Holt Company will next season put in a full line of repairs for these machines at Madras. For a certainty there will be thirteen Combines operating in the Madras section next season, while there is the probability that the number will reach a score by the time next harvest is ready for cutting.
