## 300,000 RAILWAY MEN COMBINE

## Will Take a Solid Stand in National and State Politics

Move is Strictly Non-Partisan, and Intended Solely to Better Workers' Condition.

New York-For the first time in the history of railway unions, members and delegates representing 83,000 men of the four great divisions of railway employes in the East, voted unanimously at a meeting here to take concerted action in national and state politics.

"The proper place to settle questions affecting labor is at the ballot box," said W. S. Stone, of Cleveland, O., grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

"Whatever your political affiliations, do not let party lines blind you to your interest or prevent you from doing what you think is best and right. ## CHEAP SODA DANGEROUS.

Compound Menace to Health.

New York-The cheap soda water which is retailed on street corners to school children and passers by at a penny or two a glass is, in most cases, an alcoholic beverage with a larger percentage of spirits than ordinary beer, according to an analysis made by Professor M. S. Allyn, of the Massachusetts State Normal school.
