Merrill Van Tassel, of Culver, made final year proof on his homestead before Commissioner Turner Monday. He is succeeded by J. R. Mendenhall and O. Kelson.

Dr. T. A. Long, Dr. Coone, M. W. Bennett, John McFaggart and W. R. Cook were subpoenaed to appear before Grand Jury this week at Prineville.

Miss Verna Howard, Miss Katharine Miller and Miss Warmoth, teachers at the Madras School, are attending the Teachers Institute this week at Prineville.

Geo. Holmes, with his family, arrived in town the early part of the week from Seattle. Mr. Holmes has accepted a position with the Central Oregon Mercantile Co.

Mrs. N. C. Janssen who has been spending the past five months visiting at her old home at Elkton, South Dakota, returned Sunday, and is with her husband New Culver.

Mrs. L. F. Bennett's ticket secured the date of the Central Mercantile store Wednesday, the clock stopping at 11:49, and Mrs. Bennett's ticket at the exact time.

Ralph Sharp and family, who have been spending the summer at Zillah, returned to this section the latter part of the week. Mrs. Sharp is visiting in Prineville this week.

The passenger traffic between Madras and Prineville during the week has been heavy, with the regular term of court at the Central Oregon Fair being the exception. Messrs. Sayre and Robinson have been doing a big business with their contractors on the Oregon Trunk setting off some heavy blasts in the construction of their grade through Madras and the detonation not only makes a loud report but shakes the town somewhat, which shocks the nerves of the people at a little. The blasting is on the eastern portion of the Gray homestead, where there is an outcropping of lava rock, over which the railway line passes.

A. Brown, whose home is in the Cove of the Deschutes canyon, visited the home of S. D. Percival, last Friday. Mr. Brown says that the railroad tunnel about two miles below his place, and that trains are expected to run at that point in about six weeks. The tunnel is about 25 miles from Madras. The District Attorney expressed himself upon his return, being certain that the person now in custody was the man who did the shooting and that sufficient evidence had been secured to insure conviction.

Another case of diphtheria seems to have developed in the Haystack country, the daughter of Bert Dombrowe was taken down last week, and has been under the attention of Dr. Snook. It is understood that there are a number of persons exposed in that section, and it is suggested that the people be very careful in case of exposure, against allowing the disease to spread further by using plenty of disinfectants and preventatives. Those who think that possibly they may have had a light touch of it should fumigate all their clothes and the house thoroughly with formaldehyde and sulphur which forms a gas that penetrates all parts of the house where the disease germs go and thus destroys them.

It seems that the Colorado people had an idea of getting the next season of the Dry Farming Congress and offered the magnificent Cup thinking that some of their exhibitors would surely bring it back to that state, but in that they were foiled, as the exhibit shown by Mr. Reuter outclassed anything they had to offer, and in fact anything shown from any other part of the world classed as a Dry Farming Country. In all, Mr. Reuter estimates that he captured about \$1000.00 in prizes, and the citizens of this community may well feel proud of the efforts of Mr. Reuter in showing to the world what can be done on land classed as Dry Farming Land in Northern Crook County. Mr. Reuter won three or four more prizes than were named by the Pioneer last week, these having not yet been tabulated when he sent the list. One award that was omitted last week, and of special interest to this section, was his first prize for potatoes, which was open for exhibitors from all over the world.
