**ABUSING THE INITIATIVE**

The disfavor with which these county division schemes are looked upon is shown at a meeting recently held in Multnomah county, whose sentiment is aptly expressed by the following extract:

"The fact that the voter in the Deschutes and in Tillamook counties has a vote of equal value to yours and mine on this question affecting only our two counties is another surprising thing. No wonder the Multnomah voter is staggered with the cool proposal by the Clackamas annexationists, not to mention those of the Washington crowd who wants to slip over another 112 square miles, and no wonder that the sentiment is everywhere growing for a negative vote on all these county division schemes because submitted on a wrong and unfair principle."

**DIPHTHERIA BREAKS OUT**

Diphtheria has again broken out in Madras, and at the present time there are five cases, thought to have been brought by strangers traveling through, who became exposed at some other point.

The first case to be reported in the town was Daisy, the youngest child of H. K. Nissen, and after knowing it to be diphtheria, all possible aid was given the child, but the disease was too deeply seated to yield to treatment and the child passed away Sunday morning. Since that time three more cases have developed, Mrs. Charles Dizney and son Clarence, Rose Nissen and Cap. Nissen. All of the cases have been closely watched by Dr. Long who has them in charge and he reports them to be yielding to treatment of the only known preventative, anti-toxine.

**DAN KAROUGH CONVICTED**

Thursday morning Dan Karough, the Austrian against whom the Grand Jury brought in a true bill accusing him of the killing of another Austrian, Andrew Melrich, a foreman in one of the construction camps on the Deschutes river, was brought to trial at Prineville.

A number of witnesses were examined and the case turned over to the jury Friday morning; after being out two hours they returned a verdict of murder in the second degree. The evidence showed that the defendant wore a pair of very peculiarly shaped shoes, that is, they left a track that could easily be distinguished from tracks made by any other person, and that these tracks led directly up to within a few feet of the brink of the cut in which the murdered man was working, and that his actions after the shooting strongly indicated that he was trying to get away from the scenes of the crime. While all the evidence was of a circumstantial character, it was deemed by the jury strong enough for conviction in the second degree.

The defendant will receive his sentence some time during the week, which will probably be for life.

**CHRISTMAS LAKE LANDS RESTORED TO ENTRY**

LAKEVIEW, Oregon, October 24.--(Special.)—Notice has been received by the Federal Land Office here of the restoration to settlement and entry from the Silver Lake irrigation project, Lake County, Oregon, of all of sections 15, 20 to 28, 33 to 36, township 28 south, range 15 east; sections 19, 20 and 23 to 28 inclusive, township 28 south, range 16 east; sections 1, 2, 3 and 10 to 14, inclusive, township 29 south, range 15 east, sections 4 to 9 inclusive, 16, 17 and 18, township 29 south, range 16 east, Willamette merid-

ian. This land will become subject to settlement on and after November 26, but filings will not be accepted by the Lakeview office prior to December 26, 1910.

The land involved is situated about 10 miles northwest of Summer Lake, and comprises an area of practically 19,000 acres. The soil is considered to be fairly good, bordering on the southern end of Silver Lake.

**Churning Temperature.**
