**PORTLAND'S POPULATION
GIVEN AS 207,214**
The population of Portland as an-
nounced after revision by the Census
Bureau, is 207,214, confined solely to
boundaries which have not been changed
since 1908, while in the meantime in-
dependent municipalities which are
separated from the city by only im-
aginary lines have thrived and grown
under the same impetus that so greatly
increased the population within the city
limits proper.
Adding the population of St. Johns,
6500, as conservatively estimated;
Mount Zion district with 1000; East-
moreland's 20000; Lents' 5000 and the
3500 in the Linton district, would have
made the total population of the real
city on April 1, 225,218. Going south
of the golf links, the city of Milwaukee
might be taken into the city and the
area still would not equal Seattle, but
would mean 1000 more population.
Business men and leaders of com-
mercial organizations believe that the
announced count does Portland an in-
justice by justice but no formal effort
will be made to dispute the figures or
secure a recount. It is conceded that a
recount would be an impossibility now
because of the rapid growth of the city.
