It was decided that the plant will be located on the Phillips place, which was purchased by V. D. Williamson, and on the C. K. Loucks place, about one mile south of town.

Harriman Interests Contemplate Several New Lines In Oregon Says High Official

Extension of the Deschutes Railroad from Redmond, which has been reckoned as the terminus since announcement last Spring that the Harriman line would build south from Madras. is to be made to Odell, Klamath county, is the statement made Tuesday by Julius Kruttschnitt, director of maintenance and operation of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific systems, who who has been in Portland upon a tour of inspection of railroad property in and about that city. Other extensions contemplated and under consideration by the Harriman interests is the line from Grants Pass to a point on the northern coast of California, probably Crescent City, and the Coos Bay line.

However, no definite time for beginning work on the Redmond-Odell road has been determined.
