10,000 RETURN TO THEIR WORK.

Hart, Schaffner & Marx To Arbitrate Strike.

Chicago.-By an agreement to submit their differences to an arbitration committee of three members, the strike of the garment workers in the shops of Hart, Schaffner & Marx, the largest of the independent clothing concerns, is settled and 10,000 employes will return to work within the next few days.

At a conference between Joseph Schaffner of the firm and a sub-committee of the joint conference board articles were signed by both sides. These call for one member of the arbitration committee by the firm, one by the employes of the firm and one to be chosen by the two members thus selected. Subject to the provisions of the agreement, the committee must take up, consider and adjust whatever grievances, if any, Marx shall have, and shall fix a method for the settlement of grievances, if there are any, in the future.
