Depositors in the Madras postsavings system may exchange whole or a part of their deit on January 1, 1912, for nited States registered or coubonds in denominations of assigns. 0,\$100 and \$100, bearing in-

United States gold coin. The bonds are exempt from all taxes or duties of the United States, as well as from taxation in any form by or under state, municipal, or local authority.

Applicants who desire to exchange their deposits for bonds on January 1, 1912, must be received by Postmaster Fred Davis before December 15, this year. The depositor must indorse and surrender with his application, postal savings certificates covering the amount of the bonds desired, for which he will receive a receipt. When the bonds applied for are received the postmaster will notify the depositor and the bonds will be delivered upon presentation of the receipt.

Postal savings bonds can be procured only by the exchange of postal savings deposits and will not be issued to persons who are not depositors. They may be sold or assigned to any person, however, by the holder and when a registered bond is assigned a new bond will be issued in the name of the owner.

The applicant must indicate whether the bonds are desired in registered or coupon form. Coupon bonds are preferable for a depositor who intends to hold them for a short time only and who has ample facilities for their safekeeping. These bonds are payable to bearer, and the title will pass by delivery without indorsement. Registered bonds are preferable for persons intending to hold them for a considerable period.
