 GOVERNMENT BONDS

Postmaster Davis Re-
 ceives Information

BONDS ESCAPE TAXATION

Depositors in the Madras Savings Bank
 May Exchange Their Deposits
 After January 1, 1912

Depositors in the Madras post-
 savings system may exchange
 the whole or a part of their de-
 posit on January 1, 1912, for
 United States registered or coupon
 bonds in denominations of
 \$20, \$100 and \$1000, bearing in-
 terest at the rate of 2 1/2 per
 cent per annum, payable semi-
 annually, and redeemable at the
 pleasure of the United States af-
 ter one year from date of issue,
 with principal and interest pay-
 able 20 years from that date in

United States gold coin. The
 bonds are exempt from all taxes
 or duties of the United States, as
 well as from taxation in any form
 by or under state, municipal, or
 local authority.

Applicants who desire to ex-
 change their deposits for bonds
 on January 1, 1912, must be re-
 ceived by Postmaster Fred Davis
 before December 15, this year.
 The depositor must indorse and
 surrender with his application,
 postal savings certificates cover-
 ing the amount of the bonds de-
 sired, for which he will receive a
 receipt. When the bonds ap-
 plied for are received the post-
 master will notify the depositor
 and the bonds will be delivered
 upon presentation of the receipt.

Postal savings bonds can be
 procured only by the exchange
 of postal savings deposits and
 will not be issued to persons who
 are not depositors. They may be
 sold or assigned to any person,
 however, by the holder and when
 a registered bond is assigned a
 new bond will be issued in the
 name of the owner.

The applicant must indicate
 whether the bonds are desired in
 registered or coupon form. Cou-
 pon bonds are preferable for a
 depositor who intends to hold
 them for a short time only and
 who has ample facilities for their
 safekeeping. These bonds are
 payable to bearer, and the title
 will pass by delivery without in-
 dorsement. Registered bonds are
 preferable for persons intending
 to hold them for a considerable
 period. They differ from the cou-
 pon bonds in the following res-
 pects:

They have inscribed upon their
 face the names of the persons to
 whom they are issued.

They are payable only to the
 persons to whom issued or their
 assigns.

Interest on registered bonds is
 paid by checks drawn at the
 Treasury Department in favor of
 the registered holder and are
 mailed to him at his postoffice
 address. The holder of a regis-
 tered bond should notify the Sec-
 retary of the Treasury of any

change in his postoffice address
 at least 15 days before the inter-
 est falls due. Interest checks
 and coupons covering interest on
 postal savings bonds may be
 cashed by postmasters under the
 same conditions as other govern-
 ment paper.

Payment on registered bonds
 that have been lost or stolen may
 be stopped by notifying the Sec-
 retary of the Treasury, Division
 of Loans and Currency, Wash-
 ington, D. C. If coupon bonds
 are lost the owner has recourse
 only to such means as he could
 use to recover other valuable
 property.

**WOOL GROWERS'
 CONVENTION NOV. 14**

Many Vital Questions to
 Be Discussed

PREPARING FOR STRUGGLE

The Most Important Question to Come
 Before the Meeting is the
 Wool Tariff

The Oregon Wool Growers' As-
 sociation have announced the
 date of the annual convention to
 be held at Baker City on Novem-
 ber 14th and 15th. There are
 many vital questions to be dis-
 cussed and the association is ur-
 gent that those engaged in the
 sheep and wool industry attend.
 The following is taken from the
 circulars just sent out:

Never in the history of this as-
 sociation have we been confront-

ed with more serious problems.
 The special session of congress
 attempted to slaughter the tariff
 on wool. There is no question
 but a similar attempt will be
 made by congress this coming
 winter to reduce the duty on
 wool to a minimum or place it on
 the free list. We must vigorously
 conduct the hardest fight ever
 made in order to educate and
 convince congress and the Ameri-
 can people that our industry is
 entitled to the same measure of
 protection as is given the prod-
 ucts of any other kind of labor.
 We must insist before congress
 that the wool grower is entitled
 to a tariff on wool that he may
 realize from his business the ac-
 tual expenses of operation, plus
 a reasonable profit, in order that
 he may live and not be forced in-
 to bankruptcy. President Taft
 vetoed all wool tariff legislation
 until the tariff board reports in
 December. We must get ready
 for the soon coming struggle
 which will mean the prosperity or
 ruin of the sheep business.

There will be an interesting
 business program of the most
 able and expert speakers on sub-
 jects vital to the industry.

The Baker Commercial Club
 and citizens of that energetic
 town are making elaborate plans
 for our entertainment and are
 leaving nothing undone to make
 this meeting a most enjoyable
 and momentous occasion; several
 spicy entertainments have been
 arranged, including a sumptuous
 banquet; this promises to be the
 greatest convention of the asso-
 ciation, and that in itself is
 enough to bring every wool
 grower in Oregon to the meeting.
