was designed and built, and was considered, the acme of maritime architecture. Nearly nine hundred feet in length, and having a passenger capacity of 2000, in addition to a crew of 800, the first news that she was sinking failed to convince the company officials that the dispatch was correct, so assured were they that the vessel could not be sunk in such manner. The awful realization of the accident, together with the increasing horror of the wireless dispatches as to the loss of life has completely dumfounded the officials of the trans-Atlantic steamship lines, as well as the people of the entire world.
