

**CELEBRATION OF
GETTYSBURG ANNIVERSARY**
Vote \$50,000 For Participation
by the Government.

An appropriation of \$50,000 to enable the United States government to participate in next year's celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the battle of Gettysburg was passed by the House after Representative Burke of Pennsylvania had asked to have the subject discussed by bringing up the concurrent resolution covering the matter. The resolution provides that the federal government will look after the postage, polling and sanitation of the camp which will be necessary to accommodate the thousands of veterans of both sides who are expected to be present. Representative Burke said that in some instances the states have appropriated \$250,000 each to send their veterans to the reunion and celebration. In reply to a question by Representative Mann of Illinois, Mr. Burke said that both Confederates and Union veterans would be entertained and should be provided for by the states and federal government. Representative Lamb of Virginia, a Confederate veteran, who was in the Senate and whose announcement of his fact elicited loud cheers from the members present, made an enthusiastic appeal for the passage of the resolution.

12 DINOSAURIA IN UTAH.

Holland of Carnegie Institute Calls It Greatest Discovery Made. Dr. W. J. Holland, director of the Carnegie Institute museum at Pittsburgh, who is accounted the highest authority in this country on the dinosaurs and dinosaur, has just received news of paleontological discoveries in Utah. Dr. Holland is known for his work abroad in mounting the replicas of the frame of the gigantic Diplodocus carnegii, which Andrew Carnegie presented to the king of England, emperor of Germany, czar of Russia, the king of Italy and Spain and the Austrian emperor, the doctor each time decorated with orders. The doctor learns that strippings in quarry near Jansen, Utah, have revealed the existence of three or four dinosaurs of huge size, which appear to be lying undisturbed. Up to the present time the work of excavating has disclosed nearly a dozen skeletons, one-half of which are practically perfect, all the bones lying in place. Holland says it is the greatest collection of Sauropod dinosauria which has ever been found in the history of paleontology. The quarry, which is under the supervision of Dr. Holland, is nine miles north of Jansen. The bone level now reached is in the bed of an old river, where cobblestones and shells abound in the sand covering. It would seem that the mammoth animals lay down the river and a flood blanketed them in sand and sand.

IRISH ATTACKS HOME RULE.

CHICAGO'S JUVENILE CENSUS.

Defectives and Babies Under Four to Be Listed. Selection of supervisors and enumerators is being made by the superintendent of compulsory education, preliminary to the biennial school census, which will begin May 2. The census will show the name, address, sex, age and nativity of each child as well as the parents' nativity. The census will record the number of children between twelve and twenty years, the number of children between fourteen and sixteen years who are working, those neither working nor attending school, the number of deaf, blind, crippled and epileptic children of school age, the causes for ill-health and a complete list of babies under four years old.

MADRAS SCHOOL HAS GROWN VERY RAPIDLY
Established Nine Years Ago in Single Room Building with Only Sixteen Pupils

The Madras Public School, which closes its ninth full session next week, was organized in the spring of 1903, with an enrollment of about 16 pupils, taught by Prof. P. C. Fulton, in a little one room building 16 by 24 feet. In a few years it became necessary to enlarge the building to meet the needs of the school, which was done by building a two room addition to the old building, but so rapid was the growth and development of the community, that in a few years it was found necessary to make further provisions for the educational development that was now being demanded.

In the spring of 1908 an election was held for the purpose of bonding the district to build a new 8 room building. This was carried by a unanimous vote. The new building was erected at once, and today Madras has a splendid new building with the four lower floor rooms completely

finished and occupied, the primary department being in charge of Miss Young, the 2nd and 3rd grades in charge of Miss Ethel Klann, the intermediate department under Miss Anna Warmoth and Prin. W. R. Cook in charge of the advanced department. By a careful and close supervision and with the co-operation of the patrons of the school, it has grown until today it has an enrollment of nearly a hundred pupils, doing as efficient work as any school in the country. Those looking for a location where the educational interests have received their proportion of attention during the growth and development of the great Inland Empire, will do well to stop and investigate the many possibilities and advantages of Madras, and the surrounding country.
