## MADRAS REAL ESTATE PROMOTER INDICTED

G. H. Marshall Charged by U. S. Grand Jury with Using Fraudulent Methods

Twenty-two true bills, half of which were secret because the accused were not under arrest, and one not true bill were returned by the Federal grand jury in Portland last week. Of the eleven true bills, not secret, all but one were in connection with liquor either for selling to Indians, for introducing into Indian reserves, or for selling without a license.

The eleventh bill was that in which G. H. Marshall was charged, under the act of false pretenses and fraudulent proceedings, with trying to sell vacant land near Madras in 160 acre tracts to women, with knowledge that such vacant land did not exist.
