MEDICAL EXPERTS TO JUDGE BABY SHOW

Eugenics Exposition is Arranged For September 4 as Feature Event of the State Fair

Portland, Ore., July 23. — The State Fair board has voted \$500 to be used as prizes for the Eugenics Exposition planned for Wednesday, September 4th. This is a feature of the State Fair this year for the first time and it is expected it will attract a great deal of attention. It is to be a scientific baby show, children up to three years old being eligible for prizes. A \$50 silver cup will be offered for the best boy and the best girl in the show and six cups for the best boy and girl in three divisions, the ages running from six months to three years.

Medical experts will judge the children entered from the standpoint of physical perfection, much as livestock is judged. O. M. Plummer has been made superintendent of the Eugenics show, and is hopeful of having 200 children entered at Salem. He hopes various granges, commercial bodies and districts will hold local shows in each county, sending the best boy and girl from the county to the state competition.

Public sales of dairy stock will be held during the Pacific International Dairy Show, which is scheduled for the Portland Union Stockyards November 18-23. During two days and a half, cattle from all parts of the world may be sold. In competition, only stock from the states west of the Rocky Mountains and from British Columbia may be entered. Prizes and trophies amounting to \$6,000 will be given. There will be no entry fee nor will admission be charged.

To extend the usefulness of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange, a branch has been opened in London by W. F. Gwin, manager, and it is opened to extend the fame of Northwest fruit throughout Europe. It is believed the present business there can be increased largely.

It is promised that liberal sums will be provided for the building of boulevards and general improvements in Crater Lake National Park by the Government. It is the intention to secure appropriations for \$100,000 annually for the next seven years. An item of \$100,000 has been inserted in the Sunday Civil Service bill and it is expected it will go through this session.

The Southern Pacific Company plans a new department of electric lines through the Willamette Valley. It is thought a big system of trolley interurban lines will be built up within the next few years that will aid very greatly the development of the Willamette Valley country.

Dr. Paul Ritter, Minister from Switzerland to the United States, believes large numbers of his countrymen will come to the Pacific Coast and settle when the Panama Canal shall have been opened. He was entertained at luncheon by the Portland Commercial Club the past week. He looks for a heavy movement of thrifty European farmers to this state as soon as the way is opened.

That Oregon should not overlook the chances to capture some good prizes at the International Dry Farming Congress at Lethbridge, Alberta, in late October, was urged upon Portland people the past week by Daniel Morgan, of Spokane, one of the governors of the Congress. He told of the importance of this exposition and the publicity to be gained by good exhibits.

HOW TO ECONOMIZE.

Household Expenditures That May Be Cut Out.

Woman's life is made up of little things, and this is especially true as regards the management and spending of small sums of money. The pennies slip away unnoticed until they are added up at the week's or month's end, to show an alarming and astonishing total.

The only way to remedy this is to plan out a thorough system of household expenditure and adhere to it in spite of all temptation to "launch out" in one direction or another or indulge in pet little unnecessary extravagances.

It depends on the manner of living whether you should buy in large or small quantities, also upon the size of the family and capacity for storage. It therefore need not be a matter for regret if you find it difficult to manage purchasing in quantities, for the second method may suit your case best.

Work out some system between the "hand to mouth" style of living and the purchase of large amounts. Buy your groceries, for instance, with the intention of making them last for a whole week, and see that they do so.

Marketing is an art and deserves thorough study. Watch prices and buy what is cheap and in season. When a certain fish or fruit is being sold in quantities for low prices make the most of the opportunity, even if it means rearranging all your plans for the week's meals. Above all, pay cash.

If you must buy very little buy only the best and use every scrap of it. You will find it comes cheaper than using goods of an apparently lower price, where half cannot be eaten.

Remember that hardly anything need be thrown away. It is the little wastes that lead to trouble. It is often astonishing to find that poor people think nothing of throwing away good pieces of food that a good housekeeper, even one with plenty of money, would be furious to find wasted in her own household.

The smallest scraps of meat, vegetables, fish, bread, all serve for soup, puddings, etc., and even the bones should be boiled down for stock until all the goodness is extracted.

It is best to divide your housekeeping money to cover the necessary expenditures and then live strictly within it. This can be done no matter how little money you have once the proper standard of living is discovered, as clever managers among the very poorest of women have proved again and again.

A man said recently that if his business were run as carelessly as his home he would be bankrupt tomorrow, and he said this jestingly, not in complaint.

Housekeeping, properly understood, is just as important and just as interesting as managing any business.

How to Clean White Shoes.

Already white shoes are being worn outdoors, and if the wearer has been on the street very long she has a pair of very badly soiled shoes when she at last reaches home.

Sometimes one happens to be out of the ready made preparation and here are a few things one may use on a pinch: French chalk is good and will often remove the spots when it is used as soon as the shoes are removed. Pipe clay made into soft paste with water and applied as a paint, left until dry and then brushed off will clean spots. If you have a tree for the shoes fit them on the tree and wash with a soap suds containing a tablespoonful of ammonia to each quart. Wash with a brush and rinse with clean water and place in the sun to dry. For white suede or kid shoes try gasoline.

How to Keep Butter Cool.

A convenient and easy way to keep butter cool is by applying the principle of cooling by evaporation as used in the wet bulb of the wet and dry bulb hygrometer. The butter is placed in a closed receptacle (butter dish with lid), and after this has been placed in a soup plate containing water a wet cloth is put over the dish with its ends in the water.

Evaporation goes on at the surface of the cloth, and more water is supplied to the cloth from the plate below. This keeps the cloth and dish inside at a few degrees below the atmospheric temperature, and by this means butter can be kept firm in the hottest days.

How to Care For Books.

Never drop them upon the floor.
Never turn leaves with your thumb.
Never lean or rest upon an open book.
Never turn down the corners of leaves.
Never touch a book with soiled or damp hands.
Place the large book upon a table before opening it.
Never use a pencil, tablet or anything else that is bulky for a bookmark.

How to Keep Carpet Clean.

This is a useful method to keep the carpet beneath the bed free from dust and stuff. Take some unbleached calico the size of the bed and bind it neatly. Lay this on the floor and fasten securely at each corner with pins or tape tied to feet of bed. Its removal each day for shaking purposes is a simple matter.

How to Relieve Eye Strain.

When the eyes ache relieve them by closing the lids five or ten minutes. If they have a burning sensation bathe them with hot water to which a dash of witch hazel has been added. If the whites are yellow and the pupils dull strict attention should be paid to diet.
