WILSON FUND IS \$175,000

Campaign Contribution From 12,000 Persons Comes From All Sides
New York.—Twelve thousand persons have contributed thus far to the Wilson campaign fund. The fund at present totals \$175,000.

This was stated at democratic national headquarters, which made public a list of contributors, containing, it was stated, the names of all who had contributed the sum of \$100 or more.

The largest contributions thus far have been made by Henry Morgenthau, chairman of the national executive committee; F. C. Penfield, a wealthy democrat of Germantown, Pa., and Henry Goldman, a New York banker. Each gave \$10,000.

Five \$5000 contributions were received. The givers are Charles R. Crane, of Chicago, vice-chairman of the national finance committee; Rolla Wells, ex-mayor of St. Louis, the national treasurer; Cleveland H. Dodge and Jacob H. Schiff, New York bankers, and Hugh C. Wallace, of Tacoma, Wash., national committeeman from Washington.

Protest Strike to Be Called by I. W. W.

New York.—Announcement that all members of the Industrial Workers of the World, including men and women, and affecting all the trades, would be called out on strike September 30 in protest against the imprisonment of Joseph Ettore and Alturo Giovannitti at Lawrence, Mass., was made here by William D. Haywood, one of the leaders of the organization. The call, he said, would be printed immediately in all languages and be directed to all classes of workers, without regard to organizations or affiliations.

Bryan Heads Advisory Committee

New York.—With William J. Bryan as chairman and all the candidates defeated for the democratic nomination for president as members, the advisory committee of the democratic national committee for the 1912 campaign was announced. Mrs. E. J. Walsh of Tacoma, Wash., is the only woman member. The list contains the names of many prominent democrats.

Rebels Prevent Sending of Arms

Naco, Ariz.—Mexican rebels have cut all traffic and communication between here and Cananea, Sonora, Mexico, where about 500 Americans reside. Shortly afterward a passenger train arrived here carrying 500 rifles and 150,000 rounds of ammunition, sent by the United States government from the arsenal at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Tex., to arm the American residents in Cananea.

Gross Frauds Charged in California

Los Angeles.—Evidence purporting to show that the members of the Lissner "progressive machine" violated the law in more than 200 precincts in the city and county in carrying out the plan to win the recent primary election was filed with Chief Deputy District Attorney Hanna. Hanna declared that he would place the evidence before the grand jury.

JURY UNABLE TO AGREE

Roseburg Brewery Case Dismissed by Judge.

Roseburg.—Unable to agree after a deliberation of 12 hours, the jury empaneled to listen to the evidence in the case of the Roseburg Brewing & Ice company and its five directors, charged with violating the local option laws, was discharged by Judge Hamilton. The jury stood six for conviction and six for acquittal.

Following the dismissal of the jury District Attorney Brown informed the court that he was in readiness to proceed and try the defendants on another indictment. In this he was opposed by Judge Hamilton, who said the remainder of the brewery cases would go over until the regular term of court in November.

In explaining his position Judge Hamilton said the present jury was disqualified to try the remaining brewery cases, which are similar to the one disposed of.

Attendance at State Fair Larger

Salem.—By the narrow margin of 761, the paid admissions at this year's state fair exceeded the paid admissions of last year's fair. This year 31,808 persons paid to see Oregon's big show, as against 31,047 last year.

Albany has \$12,500 Fire

Albany.—Fire which broke out in a row of frame buildings in the center of Albany's business district destroyed two stores, causing a total loss of \$12,500.

Donkey Boiler Explodes; One Dead

Dallas.—Ernest Olson is dead and G. Reynolds is fatally injured, as the result of an explosion of a donkey boiler at the Spaulding logging camp, eight miles west of Black Rock.
