New York's Wonderful and Ever Changing Sky Line

FEW years have made remarkable changes in the sky line of lower New York. The accompanying photograph shows buildings which would be entirely unknown to a New Yorker who had been abroad tive years and fails to show others-skyscraping landmarks in their day-simply because they are bidden by more recent structures. Unmistakable, in the center, towers the Woolworth building, the tallest in the world. The second to the right, with two towers, is the Park Row building, once the tailest office building in New York.
