feel that when North-  
ern products go East, there  
is such scant information  
concerning them that they do  
not get a full harvest of im-  
portance. What we would do  
is to change this order. We  
know that the Eastern farmer  
does not know how many apples of the  
variety that can be grown on an  
acre and what that acre is sell-  
ing for; and how much hay and  
corn is yielded in practical work,  
and the price the products brings,  
and what is the cost of the land  
on which it is grown. Such in-  
formation will interest the East-  
ern farmer more than viewing  
specimens, which may  
have been nursed to maturity by  
methods of what may be impossible.

Directors of the Pacific North-  
west Land Products Show are  
making the declaration that they  
make this the most original  
show of the kind ever attempted.  
They also intend to work it  
along lines which cannot  
be immensely popular  
with the people of Portland them-  
selves. Taking cognizance of  
the wave of interest sweep-  
ing the schools of the state in  
cultural matters, special  
plans are being formulated to  
make the exhibit a course of  
instruction for the children who  
attend agriculture. The  
people by the thousand  
will be drawn to the show which  
is especially designed to  
attract them.

**Public Utilities Bill**

There should be governmental  
provision and regulation of  
public utilities, the power should  
be placed in some proper gov-  
ernmental agency to compel the  
owners of public utilities, which  
consume light, power, water and  
transportation, to furnish ade-  
quate service, charge only reason-  
able rates, and treat all patrons  
equally and without unjust dis-  
crimination. To secure these  
ends is the honest purpose of  
the so-called "Malarkey Bill."

Under the necessary power  
granted to the existing Railroad  
Commission without the creation  
of a new board of officers,  
this bill was most carefully  
considered by the 1911 Legisla-  
ture, and, after a more thorough  
investigation by that body than  
any other measure before them  
was passed by the  
overwhelming affirmative vote of  
75 out of the 90 members.  
Governor West, who, by  
virtue of his previous service on  
the Railroad Commission, was  
particularly well qualified to un-  
derstand the merits of the mea-  
sure, gave it his endorsement.  
With such an enviable record  
behind him, it comes before the voters  
for approval or rejection.  
Reasons of a most unworthy  
kind are invoked by substitut-  
ing separate local commissions  
for each city and town for the  
regulation of and with the pow-  
er of the State which the bill  
provides.

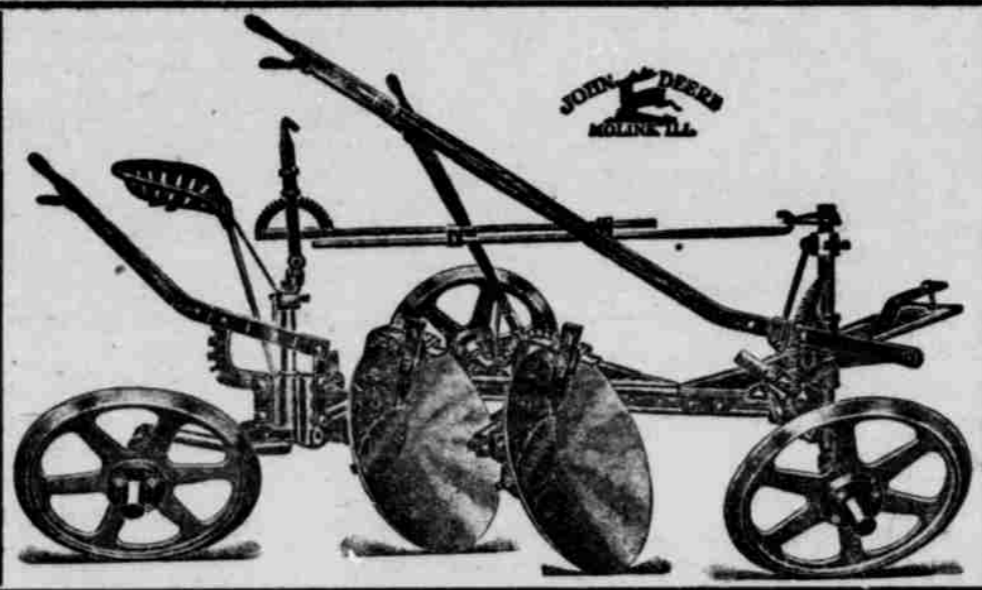
