Washington, Feb. 13.—A delegation from the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Church South, waited on the President. Rev. Mr. Wilson said that they had come to assure him of their hearty co-operation in his efforts to secure peace and quietness to the country. He said they represented one thousand ministers and churches in Virginia and a portion of Maryland. The President received the delegation courteously, each member being introduced personally, and after a pleasant interview, the party returned to the Conference at Alexandria.

General News.

New York, Feb. 15.—A destructive fire to-day destroyed the City Assembly Rooms and several stores on Broadway. Loss \$200,000.

Kansas City, Feb. 15.—A bank robbery and a murder were committed at Liberty, Clay county, on the 13th inst. While the Justices' Court, was in session and the citizens generally were witnessing a trial, twelve robbers entered the town and robbed the Savings Association Bank. Bird, the Cashier, and his son were forced into the vault of the bank and compelled to deliver up the funds, amounting to \$72,000. Bird gave the alarm and was shot by the robbers.

H. R. Pollard had an interview to-day with the President to endeavor to get permission to publish the Richmond Examiner again.

The fate of the bankrupt bill in the House, is doubtful.

CALIFORNIA NEWS.

San Jose, Feb. 15.—While the jailor William Hendricks, was feeding the prisoners in the county jail this morning, two Indians confined for murder in Santa Cruz, and Antonio Pinto for murder at New Almaden, overpowered and attempted to tie him with a cord. In the struggle he wounded one with a derringer, but they succeeded in getting his revolver away from him and all ran. He secured another revolver and pursued two of them up third street exchanging shots with the hind one who was wounded and had the revolver. After pursuing them about a block, Hendricks received a ball through the brain, killing him instantly. The Indian hid in the kitchen of a house near by, shooting at whoever approached, carefully keeping himself covered. The house was finally stove in, and he was dragged out badly shot. Pinto, and the other Indian are at large. The Deputy Sheriff and people are searching the county for them.

A dispatch from Sacramento this evening, states that the Specific Contract Act was sustained in the Senate by a vote of 18 to 10.

HARRIS DIVORCE CASE.—Details of the Harris divorce case are flooding some of our journals. It is apparently the old story in the main. The husband is cold, stern and undemonstrative; jealous and severe, not to say cruel. The wife is warm-hearted, impulsive and impudent. She wants love and sympathy, and not finding it in her husband, seeks it elsewhere—unwisely, no doubt, but whether with actual guilt does not yet appear. The domestic unhappiness which the case reveals sickens the heart. Perhaps nothing in the entire proceedings is more sad than the placing of a little girl of thirteen on the stand to testify against her parents. Her simple reply to a question intended to elicit the state of her feelings toward them—"I love them both"—is touching in the extreme. With what sad memories will these days crowd her youthful life!
