BOYAKIN ET AL.—Though the embolgio is none of our funeral and is being prosecuted to the infinite detriment of the Black republican party in whose interest Boyakin was, previously to the great demouement, imported into this county we cannot close our eyes to the turn things are taking. But like the locusts of Egypt, Boyakin is staying with them and indeed seems to be becoming more resolute all while, and determined to expose the injustice which he alleges to have been done him, and the community almost, with perfect unanimity, are beginning to ask, why, if there was really one tithe of the guilt charged against Boyakin true, his accusers do not bring him to an account for it instead on the contrary, of studiously eschewing in all their present proceedings, any reference to their former allegations. The time of the disclosure of the great crime against Boyakin was very inauspicious, for him, as, had there not been an important election soon to come off, the Black press of Oregon would have come to his relief. As it was, knowing that the charges would be used with telling effect, the blacks were compelled to try to out herd herod in the clamor against him, to the end that its effect might to some extent neutralized. By this means he got what he considered too much of a good thing, all told, and hence, having all to gain and nothing to lose, Boyakin is justified by current philosophy, independent of any moral consideration in seeing the thing out. It is a family broil. When rogues fall out, honest men get their dues. We can afford to entertain the notion of the woman when the bear and her husband were fighting.
