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## LOCAL.

**GOOD TEMPLAR'S ELECTION.**—THE LODGE.—On Tuesday evening the 29th, ult., the regular election of officers for Lafayette Lodge, No. 34, I. O. G. T., came off at their Hall in this place.

Rev. G. H. Greer was elected W. C. T.; Mrs. Elder Adams was elected W. V. T.; J. H. Upton, W. S.; Mrs. E. D. Whitlow, W. Treas.; James Bland, W. M.; Ab. Hembree, W. I. G. and E. D. Whitlow, W. O. G.

Some seventy-five members have been received into this Lodge during an existence of about nine months. The zeal of the members both old and new in the work seems unabating. Too much praise cannot be bestowed upon Elder S. C. Adams for his disinterested labors in the cause, and for the patience and impartiality displayed by him as presiding officer of the Lodge during the two terms last past.
