ADDITIONAL COAL DISCOVERIES IN TILLAMOOK.—Chas. Robinson, and Mr. Chatterton have discovered additional coal beds in Tillamook county. Specimens taken out of a bank eight miles north east of the bay, of both bituminous and anthracite varieties were brought over on last Saturday by Mr. Squires, mail contractor, which we had subjected to the ordinary tests, and which proved, as far as could be determined with the small quantity experimented with, equal in quality to the coal of like varieties found in the carboniferous regions of the western States.

One of the parties making the late discoveries is a geologist of some experience, which fact lends additional importance to the discovery; since persons ignorant respecting geological science are liable to be misled into the belief that coal has been found where Nature never intended it to be, although a blackish, charred, woody and peaty substance often lead to the expectation of its presence in places, where experience has demonstrated that it is a geological impossibility for it to exist.

ALIVE ASK IN THE FAIR THING.—Speaking of the seeming Paradox of Oregon machine shops filling orders for farm machinery for farmers and dealers in California, the Oregonian mentions the shipment for California lately of a combined Header, Thrasher, and Sacker, and styles it an "Oregon invention." We will, for the benefit of our cotemporary, a little further localize the invention of said machine. It is a Yamhill invention, for which a Mr. Davis of this county is entitled to credit.
