DECLINED THE MAYORALTY.—Judge Wait declined the Mayorality of Portland when the Council proceeded to the election of Dr. Chapman in his stead. Doctor Chapman is a good man and sound Democrat. The Hon. Mr. Rosenheim was elected City Marshal. The election of the Hon. gentleman affords an evidence that his worth is appreciated by the citizens of his adopted city.

Disgraceful Criminality.

Out of respect to the relatives of the parties to the criminal transactions we propose to narrate, we will for the present withhold names.

A being answering to the description of a man, came to this county last fall from California and stopped with his brother who resides in the vicinity of McMinnville. The brother had a daughter who is now about 17 years of age. Illicit intercourse is had between the uncle and niece. *Enciente* is the consequence. Within a few days past, and when the evidences of the incestuous commerce had between them could be no longer concealed, the parties (uncle and niece) left in the night time, on foot, passed through Lafayette about daylight on the morning following, and are last heard from at Dayton, where they pass for man and wife and take the boat for Salem. Tillamook Correspondence.

By our friend, Dr. Davidson, we were favored with an interesting letter, which should have appeared in our columns at the time. We this week insert such portions of this communication as will likely prove most interesting at so late a period after it was written. Correspondence from that quarter and elsewhere will be inserted promptly in the future.

Speaking of the Tillamook celebration the doctor says:

"The people met at the village of Lincoln where suitable preparations had been made for a moderate sized crowd, but when the different neighborhoods had met, the number present was three times as large as any had expected to see.

The Declaration was read by G. W. Elmer formerly of Yamhill County.

The Rev. Aaron Payne of your county being here on a visit, was selected as Orator. The old man made a masterly speech of one hour and a half in length. He dwelt in conclusion on the swift march we are making towards perfection in Governmental affairs. I stuck close to his argument, but failed to see the point. He wound up by urging that the men should govern the ballot box and the women be confined to the band box, when we could have no use for the cartridge box. This set a little hard on my women's rights notions.
