Progress of the Railroad.

Chief Engineer Lewis and party have reached the Lenox Church at the North edge of Tualatin Plains, some fifteen miles from Portland, having passed through the "Cornelius Pass", and found it a practical "Railroad" pass. The engineering work so far has been very laborious, owing to the dense growth of underbrush, requiring many "brush" lines with the level, and clearing away of heavy logs, withstanding these difficulties, this work has been done in the most thorough and exact manner. It is expected that the engineer will reach the head of Wapato Lake in two weeks.

We are also able to state that the work of canvassing for stock is going on with increased spirit. In Washington county, Col. J. M. Cornelius, W. D. Hare & Co. Dr. Bayley, Judge Jackson, Jas. Imbrie, and in fact all the principal farmers of the county, heartily enlisted in the enterprise, subscribing from four to eight thousand dollars apiece of the Company's stock. So far as Imbrie leads the list in amount. The committee for the first section of twenty miles has all been provided for, and considerable labor on grading already paid for. As showing the confidence in the enterprise, down there, we are able to state, that leading farmers have already agreed to commence the construction of a steam flouring mill, to cost not less than \$50,000, and will break ground on the work as soon as the Railroad Company will indicate the point for its principal depot in that county.

In this county, the work is taking a little different shape than in Washington, owing to the contest between great routes. Here the "Donations" are equal to the stock subscriptions, and increasing every day. We are informed that E. C. Kinney, Esq., has donated \$1,000 in gold coin, in favor of the McMinnville route, and that he expresses the opinion that \$100,000 will be donated, but right on that route between the "Langdon" and "Falkerson" routes. Also, that J. M. Johns has donated ten thousand dollars in real estate, and subscribed stock to the amount of ten thousand one hundred dollars on the same route. Let every man rise up to the great importance of this enterprise. Just look at what is at stake for in Portland, and what you got for it here, and then consider whether you can stand this job another year. The best of the Willamette valley farmers, on this side of the river, are losing "nearly" every year on cost of transportation alone, to build and pay for fifty miles of Railroad. Shall this state of things continue until we are all when the golden opportunity is offered, make one united puff, and secure the speedy construction of the Oregon Central Railroad.
