The house being called to order, it was moved and unanimously agreed that Hon. Andy Shuck act as chairman and Thos. E. Fristo as secretary of said meeting.

The chairman having stated the object of the meeting to be for a thorough organization of the Democracy of Yamhill Co. by the organization of a County Club, it was moved that a committee of one from each precinct be appointed as a committee on permanent organization:

And said committee would further recommend the election of a Marshall and that J. Dixon be selected for that purpose.

The report of said committee was received and on motion adopted.

Upon motion Willis Star, John G. Baker, J. W. Johnson, A. V. Clark and Thos. Standley were appointed a committee to report a series of by laws and resolutions to be acted upon at our next meeting to be held at LaFayette on Sat. Feb. 22nd at 11 o'clock a. m.

Dr. White tendered an invitation from the LaFayette Club to this Club to meet with them this evening, which was, on motion accepted.

Upon motion it was ordered that a copy of these proceedings be furnished the Lafayette Courier for publication.

The Convention adjourned to meet on Sat. Feb. 22nd at 11 o'clock.
