

TELEGRAPHIC.

Washington, March 27. The President issued an order through Gen. Grant, assigning Hancock to the Department of the Atlantic, with his headquarters at Washington.

The President's veto of the bill to prevent appeals in habeas corpus cases, was read in the Cabinet and approved. It will be presented to Congress to-morrow.

Washington, March 25.—The President to-day sent to the Senate his veto of the bill amending the Judiciary Act. The veto is very short. The President approves the first section, which gives collectors of internal revenue power to appeal in civil actions against them in an official capacity from the Circuit Court to the Supreme Court of the United States. The second section takes away the appellate jurisdiction from the Supreme Court, in cases of habeas corpus, and in any sense germin to the title of the bill, and he thinks it is quite as important that citizens should have the right to appeal in extreme cases to the Supreme Court, as government officers. The right of appeal to the court of best resort he considers of supreme importance. On other grounds he withholds his approval from the bill.

The Speaker laid before the House a message from the Senate, communicating the President's veto of the bill amending the Judiciary Act, with the act of the Senate thereon. After some discussion the previous question was moved, and the bill passed over the veto by a strict party vote; 112 against 34.

The Speaker then proclaimed that the bill had become a law, notwithstanding the President's objections.

Effects of the Tariff.

We are often told by the radical high tariff, no-tax-on-bond men, that the country would be ruined, were it not for the tax on foreign goods. The following list of prices is taken from the Derbyshire Gazette, England. Were it not for the high tariff assessed by the Jacobin government, poor men here could purchase the necessities of life at the same prices, adding transportation:

Overcoats, \$7; mens' boots, \$2.75; women's boots, \$1.22; full black dress suit (warder) \$15.50; blankets, "good size and all wool, from \$2.75 the pair; sheets, very heavy and good size, 90c the pair; mens' good gray worsted stockings, 50c the pair; good gray calicoes, 7c per yard.

Would any poor man who is now compelled to pay three hundred per cent, above these figures for the same articles, object to receiving them at such prices. If not why they give aid and comfort to the party that prevents them? Make a common sense matter of it, and decide, oh, ye oppressed poor.
