The indomitable energetic W. T. Newby, Esqr. is going around with the candidates procuring signatures to a petition praying the County Court, to enter into a contract with the Oregon Central Railroad Co., that in consideration of the erection and construction of bridges across the Yamhill river, and keeping the same in repair and granting free transportation to all material and persons that it will be necessary to transport at County expense and to transport all Yamhill goods, wares and merchandise going to and returning from any State or county fair to or from this county, that said county will pay the interest at seven per cent per annum, for twenty years on seventy-five thousand dollars of the Company's bonds.

The endorsement of the interest, is to become fully perfect when the company shall have completed said road up to the Yamhill river.

Now, we all know that a small rate of taxation on the company's property, would more than pay the interest on the bonds. The County, therefore, by this step would only virtually exempt the company's property in part, from taxation, on condition that said Company build bridges, keep them in repair, transport, etc.

This indorsement, however, will be of great service to the company, as it will enable the Directors to sell the bonds, at a much better figure by which to avail themselves of the government franchises.

All who would help the road along, it appears to us, would do well to sign the petition. And we are pleased to announce that so far as the the petition has been circulated, it has been liberally signed, and by almost everybody, so far as we have heard.

The forgoing was prepared last issue, but by a mistake of our foreman in making up the forms and a portion reduced to "pi" we could not give it place last week, as we did not get our paper off, even as it was, until near noon.

Since writing the above, much progress has been made in the matter, and we think near nine-tenths of the persons, to whom the petition will be presented, will sign it with much pleasure. Mr Simpson the La Fayette post master, and ourself have copies for signature.—Come on and sign.
