LOCAL AND DOMESTIC.

THE FOURTH AT ST. JOE.—The celebration at St. Joe last Friday was the finest ever witnessed in this county. At 9 o'clock there were nearly a thousand persons assembled at the depot, and on the arrival of the train from Portland nearly a thousand more were added to those already assembled to celebrate the anniversary of American Independence. At 10:15 the procession was formed at the depot and marched around the grove, where seats had been prepared, and listened to the oration which was delivered by W. C. Gaston, Esq. The oration was ably and elegantly delivered and as it was the first ever delivered by the speaker, too much praise cannot be accorded him. The Declaration of Independence was then ably read by H. Hurley, Esq. After which the crowd dispersed and amused themselves at dancing, swinging, croquet and such other amusements as had been prepared for them. Everything passed off quietly and peaceably. Very few drunk men were seen on the grounds. A small knock down took place, but was promptly quelled by the officer Marshal, Dr. H. R. Littlefield. In the evening quite a large party came up from Cornelius and returned on the next train.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Fort Klamath, July 6—via Ashland, 9.—The Military Commission meets this morning. Present—All the members. The Judge Advocate proceeded with the trial of Capt. Jack, Scorchin, Boston Charley, Black Jim, Stotwick and Baricho, the Indians who were present at the time and implicated in the Canby massacre. After the usual mode of opening and swearing in the Court the prisoners were brought in and arraigned. Three witnesses were examined—F. Riddle, his Indian woman, Toby, and L. S. Dyar.

Toby swears positively that Capt. Jack shot General Canby, that Scorchin shot Meacham, that Boston Charley shot General Thomas, that Hooks Jim tried to kill L. S. Dyar, and also that Baricho knocked her down with a gun and tried to take her horse.

The testimony of F. Riddle corroborates his wife's in the main. The testimony of Dyar amounts to nothing. He could swear to nothing positively, except that he was present when firing commenced and that he was chased by Hooks Jim.

The Indian scouts Bogus Charley, Shacknasty Jim, Steamboat Frank and Hooks Jim will be examined tomorrow.

A. B. Meacham is at Ferree's Ranch, 26 miles from here, and is expected to be present at the trial tomorrow—7th inst.

A dispatch has just been received from Washington, addressed to Maj. Curtis not to bring the Lost River murderers before the Commissioners for trial. It is supposed these murderers will be turned over to the Courts in Jackson county, Oregon.

The trial of the Peace Commission murderers will probably be concluded on or before the 9th inst.

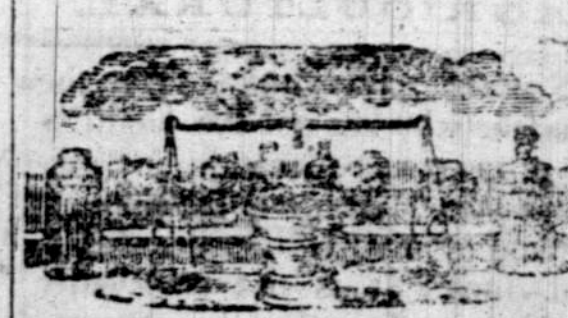
