Make more and better manure. Buy bran to feed out. Sell timoothy hay, if need be, but never sell clover hav. Study the chemistry of manures. There are many places where artificial manures can be used to great advantage. Improve your stock; feed liberally. Raise a few thoroughbreds, and gradually work your way into the business; but do not be in a burry. Set out choice fruit trees, and take care of them. Spend mederately. Live within your income. Do not discount your propects. And again I say kill weed. Cultivate the land thoroughl Make the weed-seeds grow, an then kill the young plants. I fe sure that the young farmer w follows this advice will not have to wait many years before getting his reward. I look upon it as a solutely certain that we shall g good prices for farm produce the near future. I fear we sha get extravagantly high prices. fear still more that few farme will profit by them. Prices nev have been and never can be high enough to make poor farming profitable. You must get your land in good condition now, and thus be able to avail vourselves of the high prices when they come -- as come they will .- American Agriculturalist.
