THE MITCHELL RESOLUTION.

The Hipple Convention which met at Albany last week incorporated into their platform a resolution endorsing the acts of Mitchell during his stay in Oregon.

Now, according to Col. Thompson, Mitchell's former law partner in Pennsylvania, Mitchell's wife obtained her divorce from her lord in 1867, and Mitchell never obtained any from her. He was married to the woman he now lives with in 1862, five years before he was divorced from his Pennsylvania wife.

We shall wait with considerable impatience to see if the numerous clergymen in this county will stand on this plank. There is no dodging the point now; he who votes for Smith votes for polygamy.

THE SALARY GRAB.

The Portland Convention condemned without reserve all persons concerned in passing the act commonly known as the Back Pay Bill, and also condemned the President for signing it.

The Hipple Convention that convened at Albany condemned all persons who had anything to do with passing the act, or who received any of the benefits of it, and then endorsed the administration of President Grant.

This action of the Albany Convention is palpably inconsistent. When they condemned the persons who passed the bill, they thereby condemned the President who approved it.

It makes but little difference how unreasonable or how criminal the acts of leading Radicals are, they can pass resolutions endorsing them.

The Republican State Convention of Massachusetts, which met on the 11th inst., passed a resolution condemning the President for his acts in relation to the Back Pay Bill.

DECLINES THE COMBAT.

Hiram Smith, the Hipple candidate for Congress, declines to meet Gen. Nesmith on the stump for the reason that he cannot cope with him in intellectual combat.

THE DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM.

The Democratic Party of the State of Oregon in Convention assembled do declare:

1. That we recognize and support the legal and constitutional authority of the Federal Government, but insist upon a strict construction of the Federal Constitution as necessary to the preservation of the inherent rights of the people; that we oppose centralization as the most insidious and dangerous enemy of popular rights, and will continue to denounce it in every guise in which it may appear.

2. That justice demands a revision of our tariff laws, with a view to secure revenue alone, and not to tax community in general for the benefit of particular interests and to the detriment of the laboring classes of the community.

3. That the wealth of the country is the product of labor, and we heartily favor such legislation as has for its object the protection and support of the producing and laboring classes. Capital protects itself, while labor in its numerous and diversified forms needs, and must have, the fostering care of prudent and skillful legislation.

4. That all corporations are subject to legislative control; those created by Congress should be restricted and controlled by Congress, and those under State laws be subject to the control of the States creating them; and all corporations should be so controlled as to prevent them from becoming engines of oppression; and also the property of all corporations should be assessed and taxed at the same rate as the property of individuals.

5. That we view with great apprehension the widespread corruption and dishonesty that have recently marked our public service, and considering as shameful and iniquitous the recent act of Congress granting an increase of salaries, we demand its immediate repeal, and we denounce every member of Congress, Democrat or Republican, who supported the measure, and also the President of the United States, by whose approval the infamous act became a law.

6. That the act of the President in setting up by the bayonet a government in Louisiana not desired by her people and having no title whatever to rule them was a flagrant violation of her rights under the Federal Constitution.

7. That every department of Government being in the hands of the Republicans they are justly responsible for the evils and wrongs in legislation and administration of which the country complains.

8. We are opposed to granting by the General Government of subsidies to steamship lines to import Chinese slaves to our shores, and we demand such a modification of the Burlingame treaty with China as will effectually cut off this stream of Chinese emigration.

9. We demand of Congress an additional appropriation for the removal of obstructions to the navigation of the Willamette river, and such aid by appropriation or otherwise as will open the Columbia river to free navigation by means of a canal and locks at the Cascade portage, and the proceeds of the sales of alternate sections of the public lands to aid in the construction of the Portland, Dalles and Salt Lake railroad.

10. That as the vast extent of our coast, embracing a distance of near one thousand miles in extent, is destitute of any place of resort for vessels in stress of weather, and vast amounts of property are lost yearly thereby, together with a great many valuable lives; therefore, be it resolved that we require of our representatives in Congress to use every effort to secure an appropriation for the harbor of Port Orford; first, as being adapted to an improvement of the kind, and also for the improvement of all places in the State that may contribute to our commercial prosperity.

11. That we most cordially invite all who favor retrenchment and reform in every department of the Government to its former purity and efficiency; to assist us by their votes and influence in the attainment of objects so important and desirable.

Salem had an alarm of fire from their new bell last Saturday. A fire was kindled just to try the bell.

The powers that be have ordered an assessment of twenty-one mills on the dollar in Union county for public purposes.

Ed. Byran, of Umatilla county, has this year manufactured 19,000 pounds of cheese, of which 11,000 pounds is already marketed.

Mr. J. William Welch purchased two lots last week in Shirley's Addition to Astoria for \$1,000. The lots are the identical ones upon which the Astor Company built their Fort in 1811.

A young man residing not far from Forest Grove, bought a \$150 horse for \$60 dollars and took it to Portland to sell. It cost him \$20 to keep from going to jail.

Twenty-five teams were unloading wheat at the Farmer's warehouse at one time at Albany last Monday.

DIRECTIONS FOR USING

Dr. E. Champlain's Ligneos

EXTRACT.

DYSPEPSIA.

For bad cases of Dyspepsia take one teaspoonful three times a day, or five or ten minutes after meals for four or five days, then take two teaspoonfuls three times a day as above directed. Where there is pain or tenderness in the stomach bathe the stomach well with the Extract night and morning until it is removed. In all such cases take two teaspoonfuls three times a day.

CHOLERA.

In Cholera, take one tablespoonful of the Extract in one tablespoonful of water every two hours; bathing the stomach and bowels freely every hour until the discharges have ceased; then take one tablespoonful three times per day for five or six days. The above is for Cholera in the first stage. In the second stage take the above prescribed dose every hour, bathing the bowels and stomach every half hour. For a bad attack of Cholera morbus take as prescribed for Cholera in its first stage. In milder cases take in less quantity. If cases where the vomiting is such that it will not stay on the stomach, bathe the stomach and bowels freely until vomiting ceases; then take as above directed.

BLOODY FLUX.

For a grown person, if the case is a severe one, attended with much pain, and bearing down, take of the Extract one tablespoonful in two tablespoonfuls of water every three hours, bathing the stomach and bowels with the same until the pain and running off of the bowels is checked; then take two teaspoonfuls three times a day until a cure is effected. For children under ten years of age, one teaspoonful from 10 to 15 years, two teaspoonfuls, with bathing as above directed. For all bowel complaints in children or adults, the same as above.

FEVER AND AGUE.

On getting up in the morning take two teaspoonfuls if the time for chills is between the hours of 9 and 12, take two teaspoonfuls more than half an hour before chills. If the time for the chills to come on is in the afternoon, wait until 12 o'clock to take the second dose. After the chill and the fever are coming on bathe the breast and stomach with the Extract. Wet a cloth with the Extract and a little cold water, and lay it on the stomach; continue to keep the cloth wet until the fever ceases. If the fever ceases in time, take a dose on going to bed at night. By following the above directions the chills will get lighter and come on at a later hour each day, until they disappear. After they have disappeared, take the above dose three times a day for 10 or 12 days.

WORMS.

For adults, take of the Extract one tablespoonful in the same quantity of water, three times a day; children from 10 to 15 years old two teaspoonfuls, and all under that one teaspoonful in water or milk; at the same time be careful of your diet, not to overload the stomach.

SCALDS AND BURNS.

Bathe the parts burnt and scalded immediately with the Extract, and if necessary bathe the second time, which will take the fire out entirely.

ASTHMA.

Dose—take of the Extract one teaspoonful in water every twenty minutes until relief is had, and then take one teaspoonful in water five times a day until a cure is effected. Bathe the chest as in bronchitis.

SICK OR NERVOUS HEADACHE.

Take two teaspoonfuls in the same amount of water; if in fifteen minutes the pain has not left, take two teaspoonfuls more, continuing the dose every fifteen or twenty minutes until relief is had, then take one teaspoonful three times a day until the case is removed.

MALE COMPLAINTS.

Dose—take two teaspoonfuls three times a day in a little water, bathing the abdomen well three times a day with the Extract. Where there is inflammation follow the above directions; also take one teaspoonful of the Extract to two tablespoonfuls of warm water, and use as an injection twice a day until a cure is effected.

ENLARGEMENT OF THE SPLEEN, OR AGUE CAKE.

Dose—one teaspoonful three times a day, bathing the part well morning and night with the Extract.

INFLAMMATION OF THE STOMACH AND BOWELS.

In bad cases take one teaspoonful every three hours, bathing the parts every two hours with the extract until the inflammation is removed; then use three times a day for five or six days.

KIDNEY COMPLAINTS.

Take two teaspoonfuls of the Extract in one tablespoonful of water three times a day and bathe the parts affected once a day with the Extract.

PILES.

Bathe with the Extract, and use an injection of one teaspoonful of the Extract in one teaspoonful of warm water night and morning.

BRONCHITIS.

A cough is generally present, which is increased in wet weather, and by very slight cold. This comes on in paroxysms; is generally worse in the morning, and is relieved by rising freely. The matter generally raised is generally yellowish, but sometimes it is whitish and sticky, and in the latter stages is thick and very much like that of consumption. Indeed the disease often ends in bronchial consumption.

CAUSES.

It often occurs as the result of acute bronchitis, and also of measles, whooping cough, &c. But taking cold and changeable weather are more frequently its causes. It most often follows chronic inflammation of the throat, which being neglected, gradually creeps down the windpipe into the tubes, and becomes very obstinate in its character.
