ERIOUS LOSS FROM BURNING STUBBLE.

WILLOW GLEN, near Amity. YAM-HILL COUNTY, OR., September

ED. COURIER :- This neighborhood was thrown into considerable excitement and bustle, about noon to-day, on discovering that the fences on the three farms adjoining and cornering with the Willow Glen farm, was on fire. If I am correctly informed, the fire got out as follows: The Putman boys were endeavoring to burn a strip around a large field of stubble, in or der to burn it more safely. The fire getting the advantage of the boys, got into a fence belonging to the farm and also a partition fence between Putman's and Phillips'. Here about eighty rods of fence was entirely consumed. It ran on to the corner, where it turned south-east on Phillips' burning about an eighth of a mile of fence; and then north-westerly on Putman's and at the same time crossing a narrow lane to the fence on N. J. Garrison's farm, and I believe literally licked up these two strings of about eighty rods each; and made a bold start towards burning over the Garrison farm; but the united efforts of a number of us arriving in time stopped it in its mad flight. The McMinnville road is all that saved the Glen.

DIRECTIONS FOR USING

EXTRACT.

The Best Large Payers He Bouts

For bad cases of Dyspepsia take one teaminutes after meals, for four or five days, then take two teaspoonsful three times a day as above directed. Where there is pain or tenderness in the stomach bathe the stomach well with the Extract night and morning until it is removed. In all mild cases take two teaspoonsful three times a day.
