But to lie still in bed, nothing to promote the circulation, and breathe for hours an atmosphere of forty and even fifty degrees, when the lungs are always at ninety-eight, is too great a change. Many persons wake up in the morning with inflamation of the lungs who went to bed well, and are surprised that this should be the case. The cause may be found in sleeping in a room the window of which was foolishly hoisted for ventilation. The water cure journals of the country have done an incalculable injury by the blind and indiscriminate advice of hoisting the window at night.
